INTRODUCTION TO CSW

A leader among America's progressive independent schools, The Cambridge School of Weston (CSW) has been at the forefront of educational innovation since 1886. At CSW, creative, motivated students embrace challenging work and address complex questions — with curiosity and courage. Inspired by the diverse perspectives and high expectations of our justice-minded community, they find and develop what is extraordinary in themselves and in the world around them.

Our pedagogy is built upon the student-centered philosophy of John Dewey. In his eyes — and ours — the purpose of education goes beyond the acquisition of content and skills to the realization of one's full potential and the ability to use those skills for the greater good. With teachers as guides, students take ownership of their learning and their lives, preparing them to become informed, engaged, and effective participants in a democratic society.

Our courses incorporate primary resources and multiple perspectives and emphasize our commitment to human rights and social justice. Creativity is intrinsically infused into every corner of our curriculum and teachers challenge students to push beyond perceived limitations and to make all of their work personally meaningful. All courses are highly interdisciplinary, teaching students to consider important issues through multiple lenses and perspectives, making connections and solving problems in new and creative ways.

CSW's approach to college counseling and the college search process reflects the school's progressive, student-centered mission. We value fit for the student, mindfulness, and quality of educational experience over rankings, perceived prestige, and raw selectivity.

COVID-19 RESPONSE

CSW has returned to its normal academic program for the 2021-22 school year, with students attending classes in-person and adhering to our pre-pandemic schedule, grading structure, and academic requirements. In their junior year (2020-21), members of the Class of 2022 operated on a modified schedule with a hybrid learning structure in which some students engaged in person and others attended classes remotely. The final third of the sophomore year (Mods 5-6, 2020) was completely virtual for all students. Students were graded on a pass/fail basis during this period. Although CSW did not participate in interscholastic sports in the spring of 2020 or any season during the 2020-21 school year, the school continued to offer modified sports programs and D Block courses.

THE MOD SYSTEM

The Mod System has been a cornerstone of our academic approach since 1973. Offering an innovative structure for our academic schedule, the Mod System allows for both focus and breadth in a responsive and inclusive curriculum. Here are some important things to know about the Mod System:

- Most courses are taught in a single block, but a few are taught in double, back-to-back blocks.
- Some courses, particularly those in Math and Languages, span consecutive Mods.
- For each block of instruction, students are awarded one credit.
- Athletics, other school activities, and certain arts courses happen during a fourth block known as D Block. D Block generally runs from 2:45 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day.
- With roughly 250 courses to choose from, no two student schedules are alike.
- Beginning in the Fall of 2019, all **language courses** above level three are taught as electives. Courses focus on culture and literature in an immersion-based setting, where students develop their speaking, listening, reading, and writing skills.
- The completion of Elementary Functions and Trigonometry equals a full year of Pre-Calculus.

Beginning in 2019, the academic school year has consisted of six modules. This was a change from seven modules in prior years. The results of this change are reflected below.

Prior to September 2019

(Grade 9 for the Class of 2022)

- The school year is divided into seven, five-week modules
- Each school day consists of three 75- or 90-minute blocks for a total of 21 blocks per year for academic and arts courses.
- Three to four blocks of credit generally equal a fullyear course in a traditional semester system.

Beginning September 2019

(Grades 10 - 12 for the Class of 2022)

- The school year is divided into six, six-week modules.
- Each school day consists of three 75- or 90-minute blocks for a total of 18 blocks per year for academic and arts courses.
- Two to three blocks of credit generally equal a fullyear course in a traditional semester system.

DISTINCTIVE OPPORTUNITIES AND FEATURES

PACE: PROMOTING AWARENESS AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Through the PACE program, we dedicate time during the mod and the year for experiential classes, events, and activities that will prepare our students to meet the demands of an increasingly complex and diverse world. A four-year co-curriculum, PACE has been designed to ensure that all CSW students develop self-awareness, social consciousness, healthy living habits, life skills, and equity literacy that will serve them into adulthood.

THE CAPSTONE PROJECT

As the 12th grade portion of PACE, seniors are required to complete a substantial project that demonstrates the culmination of their learning at CSW. Students examine a topic of their choosing from different perspectives and present their understanding to others in a number of ways. The project invites students to venture beyond textbooks and classroom curricula to something new and imaginative and compels them to reflect upon their intellectual and personal growth.

SOCIAL JUSTICE REQUIREMENT

Social justice and diversity are essential and integral to the mission and values of CSW. This requirement spans all departments and allows students to explore various perspectives, look at models of social change, and learn how to engage in meaningful and purposeful action. Students must take a minimum of 10 designated equity courses from various disciplines over four years.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

CSW is one of few independent schools in America to have students represented on its Board of Trustees with full voting privileges. Two students (one day and one boarding) are elected to this position each year by the school community.

OFF-CAMPUS STUDY

The flexibility of our Mod System allows for students to spend a mod off campus through one of the school's highly immersive, interdisciplinary courses. Recently offered courses include a marine biology course to Maine's Hurricane Island; a language and science field research trip to the Neotropics of Latin America; and language and cultural immersion courses in France and China/Taiwan. These courses are generally offered every other year. Due to the coronavirus, these trips were suspended for the 2020-21 school year.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

Students receive grades and narrative comments six times per year. Grades are as follows:

A (90 – 100) **C** (70 – 79) **F** (Below 60)

B (80 – 89) **D** (60 – 69)

All letter grades are designated with a plus/minus. Our minimum passing grade is a D-, and an A+ grade is not given.

An exception was made in Mods 5 and 6 of Spring 2020, when CSW transitioned to online learning in response to the coronavirus crisis. Students were assessed on a Pass/Fail basis for this period. We returned to an A – F letter grade structure beginning in September 2020.

CSW emphasizes individual excellence and intellectual and creative risk-taking, and encourages students to develop goals and internal measures of achievement; the school does not award honors or prizes, compute GPA, assign class rank, or conduct tracked, honors, or AP courses.

In fall 2019, CSW shifted its academic schedule from seven to six modules of programming. This reconfiguration has improved upon the delivery of CSW's mission by providing additional teaching time, bringing greater depth and focus to each course, and creating dedicated, consistent space throughout the year for PACE:

Promoting Awareness and Community Engagement.
