About Wayland



Graduation Requirements

Students must complete a minimum of 20 credits to earn a diploma from Wayland Academy, including the minimum requirements from the areas listed below.

- English: 4 credits
- Mathematics: 3 credits (1 credit in each of Algebra 1, Geometry, and 1 credit in Algebra 2, Precalculus, or Topics in Math)
- Lab Science: 3 credits (1 credit in each of Biology, Chemistry, and Physics)
- Social Science/History: 3 credits (including U.S. History, non-US History, and one additional course)
- Modern Languages: 3 credits*
- Fine and Performing Arts: 2 credits
- Athletics/PE: 4 years of successful participation
- College Applications: All seniors are required to submit a minimum of one application to a four-year college or university.
- Senior Capstone Project Completion

Courses are offered at the College Preparatory (CP), Honors (H), and Advanced Placement (AP) levels.

*Students for whom English is a second language are exempt from the Modern Language requirement.

AP Courses*

Wayland offers 18 AP courses: English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Statistics, Biology, Psychology, Chemistry, Physics 1, Physics 2, Physics C: Mechanics, Physics C: Electricity and Magnetism, U.S. History, European History, Microeconomics, U.S. Government and Politics, Spanish Language, German, and Studio Art. There is no limit to the number of Advanced Placement courses a student may take. Students in AP classes are required to take the AP exam. Wayland has offered Comparative Government and Politics and Macroeconomics.

*Many of our AP courses are offered as a single section.

Honors Courses

Wayland offers 20 Honors classes: Algebra 1, Algebra 2, Geometry (Logic and Proofs), Precalculus, Calculus, Anatomy, Physiology, & Medical Terminology, Poetics & Composition, German 2, German 3, German 4, German 5, Spanish 2, Spanish 3, Spanish 4, Spanish 5, Art, Piano, Music Ensemble, Concert Band, and Concert Choir.

GPA and Grading System

Cumulative grade point average is made up of all grades earned at Wayland; It does not include grades earned at schools other than Wayland. Grades with a plus or minus are figured by adding or subtracting 0.3. Grades in Honors courses add 0.5 and grades in Advanced Placement courses add 1.0 to the GPA calculation. The top mark is an A, while the lowest passing mark is a D-.

Valedictorian and Salutatorian Selection

Wayland Academy does not publicly rank its students. The Valedictorian and Salutatorian of the senior class will be elected by a vote of the faculty. The top 10% of the senior class by GPA will be selected for discussion and vote. The basis of selection will be cumulative Wayland GPA after seven (7) semesters for seniors.

Senior Capstone Project

The Senior Capstone program includes the creation, documentation, defense, and presentation of a project of a student's choosing; it is a rigorous undertaking that extends through the academic year. The project is a graduation requirement that represents a student's interests while applying their skills, developing their knowledge, and contributing to Wayland's community in education or service. In the past students have restored objects or areas around campus; served their community with events, groups, or causes; extended a project for a class or club; or researched a hobby in-depth. The program culminates in a Senior Capstone Fair that showcases the depth and variety of seniors' hard work.

Student Activities

At Wayland, students benefit from a highly structured schedule. Students are required to be in class from 8:15 am to 3:40 pm, at sports practice from 4:00 pm to 5:40 pm, and study hall from 8:00 pm to 9:30 pm every Sunday through Thursday. While boarding students do not participate in club sports, non-school organizations, and employment off-campus, our comprehensive schedule ensures that students make the most of the diverse opportunities available in our engaging campus community.

Wayland Terminology

Humanities: A course for all freshmen at Wayland Academy. This course integrates English 1 and World History, and the class meets twice per day. For students in the class of 2025, it will be marked on the transcript as one entry worth two credits because it covers both English and History courses.

Proctors: Students selected by the faculty to supervise study hall in the dorms, in the student union, or in the Chapel for music practice.

Prefects: Wayland's highest student leadership position. Students must complete an application with essays, group exercises, and an interview with faculty. Prefects counsel their peers, enforce school rules, and supervise in the absence of faculty.

Cum Laude Society: "The Cum Laude Society recognizes academic achievement in secondary schools for the purpose of promoting excellence (Areté), justice (Diké) and honor (Timé)." No more than 10% of a class can be inducted as juniors. As seniors, up to 20% of the class may be inducted.

Junior Marshal: Students must be in the top 15% of the junior class to be considered. In addition to academic achievement, students will be evaluated and chosen by the faculty based on their leadership, participation, and commitment to the Academy.

Book Awards: Each department selects one underclassman and one senior student who represents the best achievement each year in a particular discipline.
