School, History and Founding Principles

St. Stephen's Episcopal School is a pioneering coeducational school serving 700 boarding and day students in grades 6 through 12. We provide a distinctive college preparatory curriculum within a balanced program of academics, service learning, athletics and the arts. Founded in 1950 by the Episcopal Diocese of Texas, the school has a rich history of teaching students of all backgrounds and cultures to live together in community. St. Stephen's was the first coeducational Episcopal school in the United States and the first integrated boarding school in the South. Our mission and core values are rooted in progressive, yet resolute, principles: honor all faiths and traditions, support equity and inclusion, respect other cultures and perspectives, promote social justice, serve others and be good stewards of the environment.

Signature Programs

Deeply committed to intellectual freedom and academic rigor, St. Stephen's offers a distinctive curriculum that allows students to explore individual interests while developing skills in critical analysis, reasoned discourse and persuasive writing. Academic offerings also give students a shared intellectual experience, bolster their sense of community and reinforce the school's core values. The school's signature programs range from core courses in history, English and theology, to Social Science Seminars and service learning.

Core Courses History 11, English 12 and Theology 12 form the core of students' shared intellectual experience and must be taken in residence.

- **History 11:** Students investigate the U.S. experience in a broad context through topics such as imperialism, globalization, conflict in the Middle East and dissolution of the Soviet empire. The course equips students to think critically about social, cultural and political change, culminating in a major research paper using scholarly articles and primary sources.
- **English 12:** During fall and winter terms, seniors choose electives that showcase advanced theoretical approaches and creative assignments. Spring term is devoted to The Novel Project, designed to give students the freedom to craft their own curriculum and the guidance to pursue interdisciplinary scholarship. Each senior builds his or her own reading list of three novels and one alternative text (film, non-fiction, poetry, graphic novel or short story collection). Students then spend spring term researching, writing and presenting their projects.
- **Theology 12:** In this full-credit non-doctrinal course, students explore the nature of religious experience, patterns in religious thought and behavior, moral theology and ethics. Texts include Mircea Eliade's *The Sacred and The Profane*; Paul Tillich's *Dynamics of Faith*; and primary sources from a variety of world religions, including the *Tao Te Ching*, the *Bhagavad Gita*, and Jewish and Christian scriptures.

Social Science Seminars This three-term course offers a variety of electives open to juniors and seniors. Recent topics have included Modern China; Dealing with Difficult People (Including Ourselves); Modernization and the Contemporary Middle East; Economics; Psychology; Alternative Narratives of Gender and Sexuality in America; Forging Our Sustainable Future; History of Modern Mexico; and Topics in Constitutional Law.

Independent Study Students may design and propose advanced topics of study beyond the school's regular curriculum in all departments. Topics have included Aerospace Engineering, Bioinformatics, Comparative Literature, Genetics, Music and Neuroscience, and Quantum Physics. Faculty-designed independent studies are also available in advanced languages and mathematics.

Daily Chapel All students participate in daily chapel services conducted in the Episcopal tradition. Through music, scripture readings, chapel talks and prayer, students examine their own beliefs in the context of different religions and faith perspectives and consider how those beliefs affect the way they understand themselves, their relationships and the world around them.

Service Learning St. Stephen's seeks to inspire a lasting love of learning and spirit of service. Students are required to work at least 10 hours per year addressing the needs of marginalized populations and/or environmental concerns. Students also have opportunities to serve others by working with nonprofits such as Interfaith Action of Central Texas (iACT) and Central Texas Food Bank, as well as through school-sponsored service trips to Haiti, India and Nicaragua.

Outdoor Education and Environmental Stewardship

Beginning in Middle School, students may pursue numerous outdoor educational experiences—from the Devil's Canyon Wilderness Program to research expeditions exploring biocultures as diverse as the Peruvian Amazon and Big Bend National Park.

Soccer Academy, Tennis Academy, Theatre Focus

Students follow the school's college preparatory curriculum while receiving highly specialized training.

Academic Program and Diploma Requirements


All Upper School courses at St. Stephen's are taught at an honors level or higher, and there are no advanced tracks except in mathematics and Spanish. Although the school does not offer Advanced Placement (AP) courses, our faculty design courses whose depth and complexity go well beyond that of the prescribed AP program.

Academic Policy and Grading Scale

St. Stephen's is a non-ranking high school and uses a nontraditional grading scale. The highest grade in this scale is an H+, which corresponds to 100 on a 100-point scale. It is important to note that grades in the V range do not equate with conventional B-range grades. Rather, these grades represent a high level of mastery in a subject, comparable to 90-94. The lowest passing grade is P-, which is comparable to 72. All full-credit courses are included in the GPA. For a weighted GPA, all full-credit courses are weighted by a factor of 1.15. St. Stephen's maintains an institutional commitment to the integrity of our grading scale and resistance to grade inflation.
